Catch Pokémor AND MUCH MORE AT YOUR LIBI

If you've noticed children, teens and adults wandering about gazing intently at their cell phones lately, it's likely they are among the thousands of Pokémon GO enthusiasts. Since the release last summer of the hugely successful Pokémon GO, the game has motivated players of all ages to stroll parks and local landmarks, and brought augmented reality to the masses. It's also given the public even more reasons to visit many of the Marion County Public Library System locations.

Why should you be Pokémon GO-ing to your public library? Here are eight great reasons to start, beginning with the fact that all eight library locations are Pokémon GO PokéStops, or gyms. That's pretty exciting for the Pokémon GO fans, but have you ever considered the many ways your public library can augment your reality? Through books and materials, research options, computers for public use, library programs and the experience of our wonderful staff, the public library has improved the lives of many Marion County residents and continues to do so on a daily basis.

Your library can guide you through the real world to reach your goals – and that's almost as great as finally evolving1 your favorite Pokémon character! Here are some examples of how your library can augment your reality, from a Pokémon perspective.

Like Charmander,² you may be feeling the burn... but in your case, it may be a tough homework assignment. The library has physical materials, as well as research databases to help. You'll be flying high like Charizard³ in no time!

Some books can be as hard to find as the elusive Abra.⁴ But unlike Pokémon GO at your library, you can ask a library staff member for help. As quick as you can say Alakazam, you have just what you're looking for.

Do you consider yourself a Slowpoke⁵ when it comes to technology and new devices? Get the help you need with technology and beginner computer classes, available at most public library locations.

You are feeling Drowzee, 6 Drowzee, Drowzee... because you'll be "Hypno"-tized by our many programs



and events. You won't want to miss the magic or polar-themed fun this holiday season! Check out our events calendar for specifics.

Let's say you have a growing Pokémon trading card club and need a place in the real world to meet. You can Exeggcute⁷ meetings large or small by using a library study room or meeting room.


Awake the Butterfree⁸ in you with our library gardens and reading trails. From the native plant garden at the Belleview location, to the wetland trail at the Forest, or the Born Learning Trails at Headquarters, Belleview and Forest, your local libraries are wonderful places to explore the outdoors – and catch Pokémon!

Like Ninetales⁹ (who understands human speech), you no doubt love to hear a good "tale." Head over to a story time at any one of our locations, or join one of our many book clubs. Of course, you can always tell your own story at our Belleview Tailspinners Story Telling Club. You may hear nine tales or 10 tales or more! We're thinking if Pokémon GO had a librarian character to help you, the game would be too easy! That's how it is at your library – we're here to help you "evolve" your life, work and education by making them a little easier to manage. So it's game on! Be sure to visit your nearest branch throughout the winter for fun and information. In the library world of augmented reality, Pokémon GO is just the beginning.

the hands of smartphone users. Auamented reality is a live view of a real-world environment whose elements are improved by a computer, through sound, video or GPS data. Pokémon GO uses your phone's GPS to track your movements and makes use of a map that shows your real-world location. Your character moves in the game as you move in real life, and interactive objects — called PokéStops — are associated with real locations. In order to interact with PokéStops, you have to visit them in the real world. You can view the game world through your phone display, which mixes reality with game objects, such as Pokémon characters that appear for users to catch, train and battle.

1. In Pokémon GO, players are able to "evolve" their Pokémon into a better version of that character. 2. A popular Pokémon character that looks like a small, orange dragon. 3. Charmander evolves into this character. 4. Notoriously elusive, Abra is a difficult Pokémon to catch, eventually evolving into Alakazam. 5. A water-loving Pokémon character, known for her lazy movements. 6. A hypnotizing Pokémon, who tries to eat dreams. He evolves into Hypno. 7. A Pokémon that consists of a cluster of six eggs. 8. A butterfly-like character that loves honey and flowers. 9. A fox-like Pokémon that can live for 1,000 years.

Local Florida author Lvnne Matson's "Nil" reads like "Lost" meets "Survivor." One second 17-year-old Charley is in a parking lot and

then suddenly pulled by some force onto an unknown island. Charley has exactly 365 days to leave her new reality and get back home or she will die. Meet Thad who has been on the island for a while and his time is running out. Without Charley's help, he won't make it. Will they get off the island in time?


"Splintered" by A.G. Howard is a take on Lewis Carroll's "Alice's

Adventures in Wonderland." This debut novel has reimagined the classic tale by creating a story featuring Alice's great-greatgreat-granddaughter



Alyssa. Alyssa can hear plants and insects and creates art out of moths and bugs. She has delusions, which she hides because she doesn't want to end up like other family members: locked up for being insane. Alyssa must go to Wonderland and discover the truth

and fix what is broken. She soon finds out she may not be as unbalanced as she thought and maybe neither was her family.



Who doesn't love the overall story arc of "Star Wars?" Someone good and noble loses their way and turns dark. Can a villain who commits horrible acts be redeemed by an act of goodness? A book that plays on that theme is Marie Lu's "The Young Elites." Adelina, a young girl cursed with power, seeks love and friendship. In a world that has changed and where no one can trust another, Adelina will learn that she has only herself to rely on.

By exploring strange lands, other realms, magical places and realities, books open up our imagination to experience a world of possibilities. 

ost Pokémon trainers know that Pokémon hatch from eggs. But many game enthusiasts don't know the actual origin of Pokémon. Satoshi Tajiri, the creator of Pokémon, modeled the game after his childhood hobby, collecting insects. As a result, Pokémon-like insects grow by experiencing a metamorphosis or "evolution" that changes their appearance. While insects inspired the mechanics for the game, Japanese folk monsters influenced the looks and abilities for many Pokémon.

These monsters and spirits

are called youkai. Like Pokémon, youkai possess a variety of powers. In Japan, when an old house rattles or a teacup suddenly goes missing, it is presumed to be the work of a youkai. They even hide in the tall grass, just like Pokémon!

Pokémon Vulpix and its evolution, Ninetales, originate from folktales about youkai foxes. In Japanese stories any fox can become a youkai, and, as a fox ages, it gains more tails! Like Ninetales, these youkai glow with inner fire. At age 50, they gain the ability to shapeshift and at 100, they can even take human form.

According to legend, Tamamo-no-mae was such a fox with nine tails. When she turned 100 she wanted to



become emperor. As an especially old youkai, she knew the contents of any book within a distance of 1.000 miles without ever reading a page. She advertised her knowledge at the royal court by saying, "Ask me something you want to know." Eventually, the emperor himself asked, "What is the Milky Way above us?" Tamamo-no-mae wasn't sure. The Milky Way galaxy extended past her thousandmile threshold.

"I think it is probably the spirit of the clouds," she said. Modern astronomers would disagree with Tamamo-no-mae's description of our galaxy, but the 10th

century emperor was so impressed that he made her his closest advisor. Unfortunately, spending so much time with Tamamo-no-mae drained the emperor's energy until he became deathly ill.

Suspicious of Tamamo-no-mae, the emperor's advisors tried to convince her to make a holy offering that forced her to transform back into a fox. Although they intended to catch her, Tamamo-no-mae was too fast and clever. She would like to be quoted as saying "I disappeared into the tall grass with a smile!"

And so the hunt for Tamamo-no-mae continues to this day!
