






Save money at your library

The ways that an individual can save money using their public library are as numerous and diverse as the individuals themselves. Become money smart. Use your public library. Julie Sieg





hether you are opening your first savings account or are already an investment mogul, your public library has a wealth of information to help you stay money savvy. During the week of April 22, the Marion County Public Library System will participate in Money Smart Week, a nationwide initiative to improve consumer's financial literacy. Financial literacy is important because it ensures that a person has both the knowledge and the skills to manage their money wisely. Although a 2015 National Financial Capability study found that only 30 percent of Floridians are actually financially literate, your public library can provide the resources and information to help you replenish your money smart toolbox.

The public library contains resources to develop financial literacy at every stage of life. Parents with children of all ages can browse for books that emphasize how to become money smart, such as Smart Money Smart Kids: Raising the Next Generation to Win with Money by Dave Ramsey. Acquaint young children with financial basics by checking out the children's DVD series, Biz Kid\$. From the producers of Bill Nye, *Biz Kid\$* is a fast paced video designed to make kids laugh while they learn. Teens can plan for their futures by browsing through books on scholarships, grants, and college financing. The Occupational Outlook Hand**book** is an important guide that helps young adults make informed decisions about career choices, including estimated salaries and projections on job growth for the future.

Learning Express Library, a learning database featured on the library website, provides free preparation for GED, college entrance, and occupational exams. Library cardholders can access practice tests, flashcards, and e-books. For those seeking employment or looking to transition to a new job, CareerSource offers a mobile resource unit that makes stops at many public library locations where job seekers receive help with resume writing, job interviews, and more. Want to go green and save money? Growing your own food can be healthier for both your wallet and the environment. UF/IFAS certified Master Gardeners can offer you knowledge and advice on designing and planting a garden at scheduled public library programs. For more ecofriendly and economical ideas on lowering your expenses and environmental impact, look for books on self-sufficiency, alternative energy, and sustainable living. If you're feeling crafty, search the "upcycle" on the library's Hobbies and Crafts Reference database to find a multitude of thrifty and recycled do-it-yourself projects.

START SMALL.

- 1. SAVE YOUR LOOSE CHANGE. Putting aside 50 cents a day over the course of a year helps you establish an emergency fund.
- 2. TRACK YOUR SPENDING. Beginning on the first day of a new month, get a receipt for everything you purchase. Stack and review receipts at the end of the month, and you will clearly be able to see where your money is going.
- 3. **NEVER PURCHASE** expensive items on impulse. Think over each expensive purchase for at least 24 hours.
- 4. ONE WAY TO ESTABLISH a savings discipline is to "save" an amount equal to whatever is spent on nonessential indulgences. If you can't afford to save the matching amount, you can't afford the "splurge."
- 5. TAKE THE AMOUNT the item costs and divide it into your hourly wage. If it's a \$50 pair of shoes and you make \$10 an hour, ask yourself, are those shoes really worth five long hours of work? It helps keep things in perspective.
- 6. AIM FOR SHORT-TERM SAVINGS GOALS, such as setting aside \$20 a week or month, rather than long term savings goals, such as \$200 over a year. People save more successfully when they keep the short-term goal in sight.
- 7. DON'T PAY for space you don't need. Think about more efficiently using space so you can purchase or rent less square footage.
- 8. ASSESS your communications costs. As Internet and wireless use grows, many consumers are overpaying for unneeded communications capacity.
- 9. **RESEARCH** free or inexpensive entertainment in your community. Use local newspapers and websites to learn about free or low-cost parks, museums, film showings, sports events, and other places which you and your family would enjoy.
- 10. CONSIDER DROPPING credit insurance coverage on installment loans. Many consumers don't need credit insurance because they have sufficient assets to protect themselves in the event of death, disability, or unemployment. Terminating this coverage often reduces financing costs by three percentage points, a savings of about \$1,000 on a four-year \$20,000 installment loan.

PRACTICAL COUPONING TIPS FOR THE SMART **SHOPPER** by Domina Daughtrey

According to the receipts I've been collecting for the past few months, I spend way too much money on groceries. Way. Too. Much. I have known this for a long time, but seeing it on paper made it an unpleasant reality. So, this year, in addition to remembering to take my twice-daily dose of calcium, my goal is to reduce the amount of money I spend on groceries by \$35 each week. This reduction adds

After a bit of research at the library in the subject areas of personal finance, coupons, food prices and grocery shopping, I came up with a simple plan.

up—in one year, a savings of \$1,680. Not too shabby.

GO TO THE GROCERY STORE ONCE A WEEK unless absolutely necessary. Making frequent, unplanned stops to the grocery store is a surefire way to overspend. I can certainly vouch for this. How many times I've stopped at the store on my way home from work to pick up a loaf of bread and left with a cart full of groceries that I really didn't need.

CHECK THE WEEKLY FLYERS and plan meals according to what's on sale. This may take an hour or so each week, but in the end is a timesaver during the hectic work week and a money saver at the grocery store.

MAKE A LIST. Remember to have the list when going to the store. Commit to purchasing only what's on the list. Grocery lists help shoppers stay focused, organized and efficient—which reduces the allure of the many, many impulse items strategically placed throughout the store.

CLIP COUPONS. Remember to have the coupons when going to the store. Often coupons are available for items that are on sale and that I am planning on purchasing. Sometimes in addition to coupons from the Sunday newspaper (manufacturer coupons), there are store coupons for the same item—and you can use both! Using coupons in conjunction with sale items takes a bit of planning, but can be a real money saver.

The difficulty, of course, will be sticking with the plan. But I will keep the thought of \$1,680 in the front of my mind to help keep me motivated!


With many years between me and that summer I still find myself asking what it means to be money smart.


Badass in Record Time" is for you. Anna explains how taking control of her spiraling debt and creating financial stability became as individual as



books last August and adult volunteers consistently help locate materials for the book request list each day.

To all the hundreds of volunteers who support the public library system, the staff of the Marion County Public Library System extends its heartfelt thanks to each and every one of you!





ynda Spence really understands the importance of good communication. As a Family and Consumer Sciences educator for Marion County UF/IFAS Extension Service. Lynda has been providing information about financial management, aging well, and other important topics to Marion County residents since 2008. Although her current position has allowed her to hone her communication skills, she credits her former life as a cosmetologist with helping her develop this skill set. As Lynda describes it, a good stylist is often a sort of confidant, one to whom trust is bestowed. She moved from Fort Lauderdale to Gainesville in 1984 and established three hair salons, one of which she named Serendipity. She enrolled in Santa Fe Community College and then later transferred to UF where she pursued and earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in Family, Youth and Community Sciences.
