

In addition to her most recent work as a community volunteer, leader and activist, Nancy Young has left an undeniable mark on public library service for children and parents in Marion County, as our Children's Division Manager from 2002 to 2012.

Nancy has been a long-time champion of early childhood development efforts, especially for children birth-3 years of age. She advocates that the best way to support these efforts is to help parents receive the information and resources necessary to become their child's first teacher. With her "can do" attitude and energy driving her forward, Nancy developed and enhanced more library programs and services for children, including expanded collections, qualified children's staff, and story times in each of our libraries.

Nancy built opportunities for personal, "hands-on" experiences for children so that they could form an association and reference for their vocabulary development. All of the children's areas are welcoming places that are conducive to learning and building lasting, positive experiences with a public library. Nancy understands that a child's brain can make these associations and have his vocabulary enriched by offering experiences such as the Snow Festival, Construction Zone or the Fairytale Festival.

Anyone who visits the Headquarters Children's Services Division will see Nancy's inspiration everywhere. The entrance to the division is adorned with sculptures of books, donated by Altrusa Club of Ocala. Child-size activity centers, computers and displays are attractively arranged. A Florida Cracker inspired mural of native wildlife welcomes parents and children to story time. Whimsical silhouettes are dedicated in Nancy's honor. And throughout the library system, children's areas are complimented with Kiwanis reading rugs.

Nancy Young embodies a love of learning. She is an accomplished librarian and has opened the doors to the public library with her energy and enthusiasm. Her focus remains consistent and upbeat and reflects the fact that she "always has the goal in sight." For Nancy, that goal is for public libraries to provide a safe, positive, enriching and enlightening environment where children and families can come to relax, browse, be inspired to learn and explore and want more... ational Volunteer Week, April 15-21, is an opportunity for us to both recognize and thank the volunteers who generously give their time and talents to the many local and national organizations. Each and every day, their stories inspire us to do more within our respective communities and for the causes we support.

The services and resources provided by the Marion County Public Library System are greatly enhanced because of a dedicated core of teen and adult volunteers who care passionately about their public library. Our volunteers help shelve books, assist children's services staff with crafts and story time, provide technical support to patrons, help with special events and serve as a Friend of the Library. They are public library ambassadors and community advocates.

Last year, 346 library volunteers provided 14,446 hours of service systemwide. In addition, an estimated 900 Friends of the Library volunteered 30,000 hours of service.

One of these outstanding individuals, Amanda Vought, a volunteer in the Headquarters-Ocala Public Library circulation division, is a shining example of hard work and commitment. She typifies one of the guiding principles of Marion County government with her dedication to serve. Amanda shelves library materials, empties curbside book drops, searches for request materials and trains other volunteers how to tackle the list of tasks noted and more. Last year, Amanda volunteered 702 hours and was honored with a plaque by the Marion County Board of County Commissioners.


Few are better equipped at

hink back to your childhood and remember your favorite stories, the books that you read over and over again. There is a good chance that some of those books had a distinctive gold foil running along the spine, and there was a book plate on the inside where you could write your very own name. These were books that you could make part of your personal childhood library. If your book had a title like "The Poky Little Puppy," "Tootle," "The Shy Little Kitten," or was a favorite Disney tale, chances are that you owned a Little Golden Book.

Little Golden Books was created in 1942 and the company established a decidedly different take on children's literature. The books were very affordable at the price

of 25 cents each and were widely distributed. They were readily available in department stores and supermarkets, making them easy to acquire. Little Golden Books hired wonderfully creative authors and illustrators of children's literature; names like Margaret Wise Brown, Richard Scarry, Garth Williams, Gustaf Tenggren and Leonard Weisgard were just a few of the talented folks who created these wonderful books. This was truly a revolution of children's literature, making high quality, full color books affordable for the masses.

In celebration of the 75th year anniversary of Little Golden Books, Random House Children's Books has created the website www.littlegoldenbooks.com where you can explore the history of Little Golden

Books, check out some of the new titles like "I'm a Unicorn" and print out activities to do with your little ones. You can also explore the public library's collection of Little Golden Books. For a more in-depth history, check out "Golden Legacy: The Story of Golden Books" by Leonard Marcus, currently in the Marion County Public Library System collection.

Can you remember a favorite
Little Golden Book from your
past? I hope this article has
triggered fond memories of
such classics as, "We Like
Kindergarten" and the adorable,
"The Poky Little Puppy." I know
they are two of my favorites and
helped develop my love of reading
and learning as a young child. W



Tenth Anniversary Celebrations

ehind every great library is a great community. Both Belleview and Dunnellon public libraries, celebrating 10 years in their current buildings this year, are prime examples. Each of these public libraries was initially founded because residents in their communities wanted a local library. That support has continued as the libraries grew and moved to their current locations.

As early as 1886, a group of women known as the "Belleview Workers" helped start the first Belleview library. This initial library moved from home to home around the Belleview area, before finding a more permanent residence in an office building. Unfortunately, the very day that the library moved into its new

building, it burned to the ground. Not to be deterred, the "Belleview Workers" collected money and opened a library in the building that currently hosts the Friends of the Belleview Library Book Nook in historic downtown Belleview.

The Dunnellon Public Library's story of origin is very similar. The first Dunnellon library, basically a 3-foot long shelf of books, opened in the late 1950s and was organized and staffed by volunteers from the Dunnellon Women's Club. In 1961, a new library was funded and built by volunteers from local civic clubs on land donated to the City of Dunnellon. Two wings were subsequently added over the years.

As both communities grew, the need to expand the library facilities became more apparent. Belleview library patron Jeannette

Hartless remembers circling the former building in order to find a parking place and how small the building was. Dunnellon Friends member Tippy Corliss recalls, "There was no room for any programs. Tax assistance and early voting were not options." Thanks to a Community Development Block Grant, half-cent sales tax dollars, a state construction grant and general revenue funding from the Marion County Board of County Commissioners, new public library facilities in both Belleview and Dunnellon became a reality.

Hartless was the first to check out a book in the new Belleview Public Library. When asked about the change, she said "It was wonderful. It's a longer drive for me but worth the extra mile."



Dunnellon Public Library staff Mary Merenda said that moving into the new building was a blessing. And Marion Holmes, Belleview Public Library staff, describes the current facility as being "like day and night, both warm and beautiful."

The current libraries, boasting very similar floor plans, opened their doors in 2008. Today, they are vibrant, vital community centers where children, teens and adults come to learn, access information, library materials and resources; and engage with their friends and neighbors. Improved lighting, parking and additional space for programs, community meeting rooms, public computers and more have greatly enhanced the library experience for all who enter the

doors. Usage at both Belleview and Dunnellon locations increased dramatically after the moves. Circulation of library materials at both public libraries more than doubled, as has the foot traffic.

Ocala's own "Fancy Nancy" says
about her life's journey.

"A Girl Scout badge....12 years old, an active Girl Scout whose adventures took me to the second floor of the Rec Center in South Charleston, West Virginia, the Public Library, and Mrs. Miller, the librarian. She was my introduction to the "world of possibilities" — two degrees and 58 years of experiencing "possibilities" through library work, both as a professional and a

volunteer in six different types of libraries. Working with and on behalf of children, introducing the wonders of books and reading and libraries in school and public libraries was the best! Oh, what fun I have had!"

Nancy Young was the Children's Services manager for the Marion County Public Library System for 10 years. After retiring from the library in 2012, Nancy continued with her love for children as a member of the Friends of the Ocala Public Library board of directors. She is the chair of the Friends Advocacy Committee and a constant voice for adequate funding of libraries.

Nancy began her career as a school librarian in Illinois, where she lived before coming to Marion County, and she has an elementary school there named



after her! Nancy is a member of United Way's Success By 6 Leadership Council, which is a local effort to ensure that every child is safe, healthy, eager to learn and ready to succeed by their sixth birthday. She introduced the national program Read Aloud 15 MINUTES Every Child, Every Parent, Every Day to the Early Learning Coalition (ELC). For ELC, she has painted Born Learning Trails on library walkways and parks. And in 2015, Nancy was recognized by the Marion County Children's Alliance as their Children's Champion.
