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

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FROM THE DIRECTOR


n September 9, 2010 we will celebrate the 10th Anniversary of our Freedom Public Library. It will be a day of appreciation, celebration, and reflection. When Freedom Public Library was named, a citizen committee was appointed by the Marion County Board of County Commissioners. The origin of the name came from a discussion about what the public library in America represents-Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Information, and Freedom of Inquiry.



The public library is an American "invention." Ben Franklin organized a subscription library that pooled the books of Philadelphia residents in 1731. This was the forerunner of the public library today. During the American Revolution (1773-1783) the idea of allowing "ordinary" citizens to take books home blossomed. Several cities within the New England states claim to have been the first free, tax supported public library in America, though it is unclear which city was the first. What is clear is that by the national centennial there were nearly 4,000 free public libraries in Amer-

Citizens saw the need for each person to have unrestricted access to information, not just those who could afford it. Public Libraries make information available, affordable, and accessible to people from all walks of life. Andrew Carnegie, industrialist and philanthropist, rightly called the public library "The People's University." He believed the public library to be the ultimate "self help" institution where anyone who walks through the doors, does so willingly.

Individuals need information to live, to learn, to work, and to govern in a democratic society... Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Information, and Freedom of Inquiry. What better time than now to recognize and thank our veterans who have fought for the freedoms we hold dear?



At 7:48 a.m. on May 4, 1945, Jim Phillips (at right, top) was aboard the destroyer USS Luce when his ship was attacked by waves of Kamikaze suicide planes 75 miles north of Okinawa. As the ship sankt, Phillips floated off the stern of the ship, assisting a severely wounded shipmate. They were to spend the next eight hours in the sea, during which time Phillips was separated from his shipmate. After being picked up by another destroyer and transferred to a hospital ship, Phillips learned that he was one of only 82 survivors. He had survived not only the sinking, but being strafed by Japanese planes while in the water.

After a 17-year Navy career, Phillips retired as Chief Petty Officer, and engaged in several business ventures in Ocala. Like so veterans, he became involved in affairs, including being ovolunteers engaged in it. Veterans Park, which is the veterans Park which is the veteran

sk the veterans of the Fort McCoy Veterans of Foreign Wars Retirement Home about the significance of Infreedom on the written page. Recent renovations to the home made possible by Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding (administered by Marion County Community Services) have included the addition of a new VFW Home Veterans Library room. For residents Carolyn and Robert Riggs, having an on-site library will mean having access to books in print, audio, and DVDs with a whole section devoted to World War II. "These men and women preserved freedom for us," said Carolyn. "You don't always learn about all of this in school. You

have to get into a library and a book and explore it on your own." For many residents, having on-site access to large print books and audiobooks is a necessity due to vision impairment.

According to VFW Home Deputy Director and Community Coordinator, Gera Judge, "With this renovation, our veterans will be better able to access books and materials, as well as display some of their memorabilia. The new library room will also be a place where students can come and interview our veterans to hear their stories first-hand." ears of free CÉLEBRATING THE FREEDOM PUBLIC LIBRARY

ike a home, a building needs people to give care and take an interest in it for it to be a comfortable and useful place. I first walked through the doors of the newly completed Freedom Public Library in mid-August 2000. My recollec-



Nearly one-quarter of all materials checked out from the Freedom Public Library through this past June, 2010, were children and young adult materials. Florida Library Youth Programs, including pajama parties, story times, library field trips, and teen workshops hosted at the Freedom Public Library this summer, have also increased to fill the needs of a community whose growth has outpaced the library facility.

"Since 2000 the library has continued to grow," says Friends of the Freedom Public Library President Pat Babski, "...space [for materials] is limited. The meeting room is too small to handle the large crowds for the children's programs and the Friends activities." Growth of the Freedom Public Library was anticipated; the building was designed to expand from the current 8,100 square feet to a whopping 32,000 square feet, and is part of the Marion County Public Library System's long range, Capital Improvement Plan.

Freedom Public Library Branch Manager, Heather Ogilvie, says Freedom is, "a dynamic facility for a dynamic community and we make a difference." With that in mind, Marion County's "Doing More with Less," maxim is being applied to the current library layout.

tion of that building, with its bare walls and absence of shelving, was that it was stark, and as yet, unloved. Ten years later, as the Freedom Public Library celebrates a decade of public service, there can be no doubt that the library has met the expectations placed on it, to become a living, growing part of the community it serves.

The collection of retiree and singlefamily communities concentrated along Marion County's State Road 200 corridor is largely to thank for the birth of the Freedom Public Library. For years, library users in Southwest Marion County used the Bookmobile, which provided limited service half-a-day every other week. As the community grew, Bookmobile service increased to one full day each week, and Bookmobile users clamored for more materials and services.

Further evidence of the Freedom Public Library's adoption by the folks in Southwest Marion County shows in the ever-increasing use of the library; 169,666 items checked out this year-todate, compared to 4,145 items in Freedom's first year. Children's programming has increased to meet the need of younger families living in the area.

According to Marion County Public Library System Assistant Director, Patsy Marsee, a makeover of Freedom's floor plan, includes utilizing taller shelves to hold more library materials, self-service stations to free up staff and reducing staff space to increase public space, may temporarily improve the limited space issue.

The growth of the Freedom Public Library over the past ten years has shown how much Marion County appreciates the materials and services offered by a public library. That once stark, unloved building now bursts with over 21,390 registered users, proving that with or without a major expansion, the Freedom Public Library will continue to grow and thrive within the community it serves.

"No matter the changes the library may go through," says Heather Ogilvie, "our goal remains the same, which is to serve the needs of the community."







Orofies A Friend of Fate

en Tipper is the kind of person who appreciates his friends. Perhaps this is because on several memorable occasions in his life, he became fast friends with fate; instances of chance or coincidence that colored his experiences and brought him to Ocala and the Friends of the Ocala Public Library.

Born in Birmingham, England, in 1921, Ken and his family weathered the Depression. At age 17, he saw an ad seeking a copyholder to a proof reader for a major Birmingham newspaper. An avid reader even as a young boy, Ken also excelled in composition. With those winning traits under his belt, he applied for the job and was hired.

But fate had a different course in mind for Ken as the realities of World War II were to impact his life. He first joined the Home Guard and, shortly thereafter, the British Royal Navy in June, 1941. He trained as a radio operator, with special training for interception, and was assigned to duty on the British destroyer HMS Punjabi.

In May, 1942, in thick fog, the Punjabi was rammed and cut into two by the battleship HMS King George V. Ken graphically describes the event as, "There were 15 minutes between



me and oblivion." The person he was scheduled to relieve on duty at the time of the collision was one of the 49 men who were killed. He and his surviving shipmates were later picked up by another destroyer and later transferred to the battleship that sank them. Once on board, he met up with a sailor with whom he had worked at the newspaper in Birmingham.

Discharged in 1946, Ken went back to work for the Birmingham newspaper while fate waited for another opportunity to insinuate itself into his life. A self-proclaimed jazz fan, Ken attended a local dance one evening where he met his future wife Norah. He later realized that he and Norah had lived in the same By Karen Jensen

Birmingham neighborhood as children. They were married three months later and have been together for 64 years.

In 1957, Ken, Norah and their two children came to the US, where he took a job with Rinker Materials in south Florida. He retired in 1985 as Palm Beach District Sales Manager, and he and Norah moved to Ocala. His love for reading led him to become involved with the Advisory Board for the original Ocala Public Library.

Now a member of the board of the Friends of the Ocala Public Library, Ken has served as the Publicity Chair, and is responsible for various press releases and articles pertaining to Friends programs and activities. A strong advocate for the Marion County Public Library System, Ken said, "I believe in maintaining the standards of library service as it is such an important community asset. I constantly marvel at the abilities of the Friends of the Library board members and what they have accomplished."

A writer for the former Central Florida Community College "Scene," Ken is a featured writer for the Marion County Public Library System WORDS newsmagazine, and has also written articles for the Star-Banner newspaper.
