
hether we associate it with love, courage, sacrifice, power, danger or even anger, one thing is certain; the color red arouses a wide range of human emotions. One of the primary colors, red triggers more opposing emotions than any other color in the spectrum.

A red heart shape is pretty much the universal symbol of loving, affectionate feelings. Red is also associated with sacrifice and is used in conjunction with certain religious beliefs. The red poppy flower is symbolic of the honor paid on Veterans Day to those courageous

Armed Forces veterans who have served their country.

Red grabs our attention. Its use in stop lights, as well as fire and emergency vehicles, generates an immediate response. Idioms that include such phrases as "seeing red" or "caught red-handed" initiate a particular emotional association to possible danger or a warning.

A flushed, red face typically signifies anger. Cartoon and graphic novel characters, and even emojis depicted with a red face, are quickly identified, and there is little confusion about the emotion being portrayed. Conversely,



Advertising efforts frequently use the color to promote a variety of products, as studies indicate it has an energizing effect on the viewer. An automobile advertisement using a sleek red car might make the viewer consider taking a test drive. And one look at an ad with a luscious red velvet cake might result in us contemplating our next meal.

Red is also a color often associated with power. The traditional red "power tie" has long been an image that conjures up a powerful figure. And the term "rolling" out the red carpet" denotes an action where celebrities and dignitaries are on display for all to see and revere.

Like many other colors, our response to red is often shaped by our own personal likes or dislikes, and life experiences. Like it or not, bold, exhilarating red will continue to garner lots of attention in whatever manner it's displayed. 🗘

The library's e-book platform, Freading, contains a treasure trove of electronic craft books, with an amazing number of books about quilling, a way of making beautiful art out of curled strips of colored paper. 
"The Color Red and Its Cultural Significance"

ong before the days of modern civilization, the color red made its dramatic appearance. Its use can be traced back to the Stone Age when hunters used red clay as the base for body paint. Prehistoric man used red ochre to paint cave walls, often depicting animals and people in various stages of battle.

In many Western cultures, red is the color of war, blood and courage. The young soldier in Stephen Crane's classic Civil War novel, "The Red Badge of Courage," is ashamed of being a coward and wants to be wounded so that his "red badge" will prove his bravery. Perhaps this is why President Ronald Reagan said that the red stripes of the flag stand for valor and readiness to sacrifice.

The Japanese have 23 different names for shades of red. Temples and torii gates are painted vermillion, which protects against evil, and brides in Shinto weddings wear white kimonos with red hems for good fortune. But red objects should never



be given as housewarming gifts in Japan. Red might be lucky, but it's also the color of fire!

In Russian culture, the word for "red" and the word for "beauty" have similar linguistic roots. This is why many of the famous city squares in Russia, including the famous Red Square in Moscow, are also known as the Beautiful Square.

Red has permeated human culture since the first human gazed into the crimson heart of a campfire or washed the blood of the hunt from their hands. While its symbolism may differ from culture to culture, its primal meaning draws a scarlet thread of life, death, passion and protection through the human experience all across the globe. 🗘

STRAWBERRY WATERMELON CRUSH

- 1 pint strawberries
- 2 cups watermelon
- 1/3 cup sugar
- ½ cup your favorite clear beverage
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 2 cups ice cubes

RED VELVET WHOOPIE PIES YIELD: 14

CAKES:

- 1 box Red Velvet cake mix
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 2 eggs

FOR CAKES (makes 28 cakes):

- 1. Preheat oven to 350° F.
- 2. Line baking sheets with parchment; set aside.
- 3. In medium bowl, mix together cake mix, oil and eggs.
- 4. Spoon batter in 1- or 2-inch diameter rounds, about 1/2-inch high onto prepared baking sheets, allowing 1 inch between each round; or use small scoop (#50 disher).
- 5. Roll into balls and flatten with the ball of the
- 6. Bake 7 to 9 minutes or until tops are set.
- 7. Cool on baking sheets on wire rack, then remove to rack to cool completely.

FILLING:

- 3 tbs. unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 3 oz. cream cheese, at room temperature
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 11/2 c powdered sugar

FOR FILLING:

In a medium bowl, beat the butter until smooth with no visible lumps. Add the cream cheese and beat until combined. Add the powdered sugar and vanilla and beat until smooth. Be careful not to overbeat the filling, or it will lose structure.

ASSEMBLY:

- 1. Turn over half of the cakes so that the flat side is up and place 1-2 tablespoons (OR, using small scoop, place 1 scoopful) of filling on the flat side of the cakes.
- 2. Top with remaining plain cakes, flat sides down, and press gently to spread filling to the edges.
- 3. Store whoopie pies in fridge until ready to serve. Allow whoopie pies to sit at room temperature for 10 minutes before serving.

BOOK DONOR

Dr. Thomas C. Marks


ook donations have long been a staple funding source for the various Friends of the Library groups. Depending upon the donation, as well as the individual group, some donations find themselves on the shelves of their library or Friends book store, while others are accessible in library lobby areas. Each Friends group engages its team of volunteers to sort through the donations to be processed for book sales that occur on-site and, in some instances, online.

A recent book donation to the Friends of the Ocala Public Library emphasizes the significance of these contributions. The importance is two-fold; not only for the proceeds they provide to the Friends and subsequently the Marion County Public Library System, but also as they relate to the donors themselves, providing insight into their lives as readers and lovers of the written word. The donor in reference was the late Dr. Thomas C. Marks.

Marks earned a bachelor's degree from Florida State University and then his Juris Doctor from Stetson in 1963. He went into active duty in the U.S. Army JAG Corps and was sent to Vietnam. When Marks returned home, he remained in the reserves for another nine years, leaving the military as a Major.

Dr. Marks completed his doctorate in political science from the University of Florida and taught political science and criminal justice at the University of South Alabama. In 1973, he returned to Stetson where he taught U.S. and Florida constitutional law until his retirement in December 2007. Beloved by both faculty and his students, he was known for mentoring his students and helping them develop a deeper knowledge and understanding of the law.

I had the opportunity to meet with Dr. Marks' wife Nancy and talk about his life and the positive impact he had on those with whom he came in contact. An adorable "4-legged" family of special needs dogs greeted me at their home and Nancy shared how their canine rescue efforts were part of his interest in giving back to society. Members of St. John's United Methodist Church, where the Marks attended and Dr. Marks taught Sunday school, describe the couple as "... their lives have always been about service."



Nancy shared that Dr. Marks' parents helped to instill a love of reading in him as a child. He was a voracious reader throughout his life, interested in many different topics, including history, World Wars, railroads and biographies, especially those pertaining to actor John Wayne. Dr. Marks' donation to the Friends of the Ocala Public Library included a collection of many of his favorite fiction and non-fiction books.

Nancy Marks would describe her late husband as "one in a billion. They don't make them like him anymore." For readers who love finding that gently used book, Dr. Marks left a legacy of personal favorites for others to enjoy. 

FIRST SERGEANT (USMC, RETIRED) Allen Harrison

ed, a beautiful primary color, is one that many associate with love, life, health and vigor. Yet, among those who serve our country in the military, the color red has a much deeper meaning. For retired First Sergeant Allen Harrison, the first image red brings to mind is the American flag and the stars and stripes that he dedicated his life to serve. His second reflection prompted by the color pertains to the R.E.D. (Remember Everyone Deployed) initiative that encourages everyone to wear red on Fridays to show support for those serving far away from home.
