used it? What made a good arrowhead and what made it worthless? What if you got your own flint and tried to mimic the way the Native Americans made arrowheads?

NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK: THEN AND NOW

s far back as 1916, communities have celebrated their public libraries with various events. The first National Library Week observance was established in 1958, when the American Library Association (ALA) and the National Book Committee teamed up.

In the early 1950s, post war Americans were spending much of their free time watching television or listening to the radio and less time reading books. The National Book Committee came up with the concept of a National Library Week celebration to encourage children and adults to get excited about reading!

As a result, public libraries started raising funds for library materials and bookmobiles, and Friends of the Library groups were established in many cities. Although the National Book Committee was dissolved in the 1970s, ALA pushed forward and got creative with National Library Week promotional efforts. Press releases, featuring national celebrities talking about the great things occurring in public libraries, were featured in newspapers, on television and the radio. In the 1990s, a website was created for "Log-on @ the Library Day" to help libraries introduce Americans to the internet. And in 2008, celebrity support of National Library Week was expanded with the selection of an honorary chair for each year's celebration.

Today, National Library Week also coincides with National Library Workers Day, National Bookmobile Day and Take Action for Libraries Day. This year National Library Week will be celebrated April 3–9, and the theme is "Connect with Your Library." As communities everywhere deal with the realities of the Covid-19 pandemic, this phrase has taken on a whole new meaning for public libraries. Over the past two years, your Marion County Public Library System has developed new ways to stay connected to the community by offering curbside pickup of library materials and virtual programming for all ages. Access to the public library system's digital resources such as OverDrive, Freading and various databases continues to provide opportunities to stay connected with one's community and the world. \checkmark



eople love to explore. Whether it's an extensively planned excursion to another country or a new location within your own home town, these adventures are a welcome respite for most everyone. Speaking of local areas to visit, why not take a trip to one of the over 50 unique sites managed by the Marion County Parks & Recreation Department? With many parks, memorials, beautiful natural springs, sports complexes, boat ramps and more, adventures are just around the corner!

The Parks and Recreation Department has four divisions: Administration, Operations, Recreation and Design with a total of 61 employees managing the department. In 2021, Parks brought in \$1,769,000 in revenue and hosted 2.5 million visitors. They also generated over \$3.5 million in direct economic benefit



to our community. According to Director of Parks and Recreation, Jim Couillard, "The parks system saw record setting attendance over the past two years as the benefits of being outside and leading a healthy lifestyle have never been as important as they are today."

Other highlights from the Parks 2021 calendar of activities included a pickle ball tournament at Coehadjoe Park, the annual Brick City Carnival with 4,000 attendees and the Cal Ripken 8U World Series held at the Rotary Sportsplex. Many improvements have been made to Parks locations, including ADA accessible sidewalks at the Babe Ruth baseball fields and a rebuilt parking lot at Moss Bluff North.



Parks staff have lots of exciting ideas for 2022 as well. Later this year, Parks will host the first ever Paddle Battle, a kayak race for the general public at KP Hole, with prizes awarded to the winners. Other events include a kayak race to raise money for their summer camp scholarships and new events at the Forest Community Center.

Exploring your world isn't always about finding something new, it can also be about reconnecting in familiar places with family and friends. From hiking trails to boating and swimming or even a relaxing picnic, there are many local ways to "explore your world" right here at Marion County Parks and Recreation. 
"Red, White, and Whole" by Rajani LaRocca

"I have two lives. One that is Indian, one that is not." Reha struggles to fit into both the Indian-


American community of her family and the primarily white middle school she attends. When her mother becomes ill, though, Reha finds that it will take both lives to give her the strength she needs.


"Power Forward" by Hena Khan

Marion County Day Celebrates Marion County's Unique 178-Year History by mark anderson

n March 26, the county gathers to celebrate Marion County's unique 178-year history at Marion County Day, an annual festival featuring food trucks, vendors and fun activities from around the county. First held in 2019 to celebrate the county's 175th birthday, Marion County Day was put on hold in both 2020 and 2021 due to Covid-19. Now, Marion County is excited to again host Marion County Day at the McPherson Governmental Complex on March 26 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

MARION COUNTY HISTORY

Many settlers relocating to the area after Florida's purchase from Spain in 1821 came from South Carolina. When forming a new county in 1844, settlers also came from parts of Alachua, Hillsborough, and Mosquito (Orange) Counties. Those settlers decided to name it after Revolutionary War hero General Francis Marion, the "Swamp Fox" who also hailed from South Carolina.

Florida officially became a state in 1845, and the first county commission in 1846 named the county seat "Ocala," a modification of the name "Ocali," a Timucuan Native American name for the area.

On Thanksgiving Day in 1883, a fire raged through downtown Ocala, destroying several businesses. When rebuilding, construction crews used bricks instead of wood or other materials, leading to the "Brick City" nickname that's still used today in Ocala's downtown square. The fire also led to the formation of Ocala's first fire department in 1885, one of the oldest in the state of Florida. These are just a few of the stories from nearly two centuries of history right here in our community.

MARION COUNTY NAMES FREEDOM PUBLIC LIBRARY MEETING ROOM IN HONOR OF LIFELONG EDUCATION ADVOCATE, FLORENCE FAY PRITCHARD

he Marion County Commission recognized Florence Fay Pritchard on Nov. 16, 2021 for her help promoting literacy, the Friends of the Freedom Public Library and the Marion County Public Library System. In honor of her efforts, the county commission announced that it was renaming the meeting room at the Freedom Public Library in southwest Ocala the "Florence Fay Pritchard Meeting Room."

At the meeting, county commissioners called Pritchard to the stage to highlight the work she has done in aid to the Marion County Public Library System, as well as to award her a certificate of recognition.

Pritchard holds a doctorate degree in administration, supervision and curriculum development. She joined the

Friends of the Freedom Public Library after moving to Marion County in 2012. She immediately assumed a leadership role with the group, serving as both vice president and eventually president, a role she continues to hold today.

She was instrumental in developing and guiding the Marion County Friends Council that helps to bring together the six Friends of the Library groups in Marion County.

Pritchard was also recognized for her efforts by Marion County Commissioner Kathy Bryant and Commission Chairman Carl Zalak at the Jan. 22 Friends of the Freedom Public Library annual meeting at the Freedom Public Library. **(7)**

MARION COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY SYSTEM AWARDED FLORIDA STATE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) GRANT

he Marion County Public Library System was awarded a Division of Library and Information Services (DLIS) Florida American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant for \$150,278 last fall.

According to Julie Sieg, director of the Marion County Public Library System (MCPLS), "The grant funds will be used for purchasing e-audio for general interest and developing a collection of e-books to expand access to vocational and career electronic resources. This collection will assist job seekers, those wanting to learn new skills and advance job opportunities, as well as those who may wish to start their own business."

The expanded digital resources will be available for check out to all those with a Marion County Public Library System card.

In addition to the expansion of their digital collection, the Marion County Public Library System will add selfcheckout kiosks at the Headquarters-Ocala, Belleview, Dunnellon, Freedom, Forest and the new 2022 library branch in the Mary Sue Rich Community Center at Reed Place. The ARPA funding will also allow the MCPLS to implement wireless printing system-wide, as well as install two new in-service printers at the Headquarters-Ocala Public Library.

This project is funded under the provisions of the DLIS Florida American Rescue Act (ARPA) from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. Florida's DLIS Florida ARPA program is administered by the Department of State's Division of Library and Information Services.



Leroy Simon


eroy Simon and his camera have explored the rainforests of Costa Rica and Ecuador six times. One time, a monkey stole his hat, put it on its head and climbed up a tree. Simon released the shutter just before the monkey dropped the hat. On another trip, an ocelot sneaked into his hotel room through an open window. A woman from the hotel caught the cat and held it long enough for Simon to capture a photograph.

These photographs are just a few of the thousands Simon has captured over 70 years. At 89 years old, Simon has been fascinated by nature his whole life. When he was 20 years old, serving in the army, he "got serious" about photography and bought a Contax camera. Simon has no formal education in photography and insists, "Everything I learn is from listening to people who know more than I do."

At Belleview Public Library, staff look forward to Simon bringing his most recent photographs to share while he checks out books. Over the years he has loaned his photographs for public displays, donated prints to the Friends of the Belleview Library for fundraising efforts and presented programs to the public on butterflies, moths and birds.

Simon is a frequent speaker for Marion Audubon, has won countless photography contests and has the honor of having more than 30 photographs published in the classic book "Florida's Fabulous Butterflies and Moths." He has also curated and printed 15 photography books, but these books are not for sale. Their value is in the stories he shares.

For new nature photographers, Simon stresses the importance of patience. His advice is to watch birds and take notice of their behavior. If you are hoping to photograph a moth or butterfly, it's a different process. "On a lucky day you might find just a few



insects," he says. To find large moths, try visiting a gas station in the Ocala National Forest just before daylight.

Simon's stories prove you don't have to travel far to explore your world. Locally, he frequents Gainesville's Sweetwater Wetlands Park and the Ocala Wetland Recharge Park. But for those looking for a daytrip, he recommends Fort DeSoto Park in Pinellas County, which "is so preciously undeveloped that there is only one snack stand if you get hungry!"

Check out Leroy Simon's photographs on display at the Belleview Public Library and keep an eye on the Marion Audubon website for recordings of his presentations and to see where he will be speaking next. \checkmark
