hould old acquaintance be forgot and never brought to mind?" The familiar words of "Auld Lang" Syne" are sung at New Year's when the month of January presents itself as a door through which we pass, looking back on the old and ahead to the new.

In fact, January gets its name from the Roman god Janus — referenced as the god of doors and gates. Janus is also depicted as a deity with two faces — one facing behind and one facing ahead.

The duality of this mythological deity with the two faces also prompted the use of a descriptive term, "Janus word;" meaning a word that has two opposites or nearly opposite meanings. Examples

of Janus words and phrases include, "hold up," meaning to lend support or to impede progress and "cleave," meaning to separate or to adhere.

But there are other references to the Janus duality. For example, there are Janus cats that have two faces on one body. Janus particles are microparticles that have two distinct faces with different properties. And there is a "Janus effect" referenced in the business world, where executives review what has occurred in the past to more aptly make informed decisions for the future. There's also a Marvel superhero named Janus who could make a duplicate of himself. And,

a ruthless villain with burns on half of his face led the sinister Janus Syndicate in Bond movies and novels.

The Romans also saw Janus as the mediator between all dualities such as life and death; war and peace; and beginnings and endings. We've all no doubt heard the phrase "everything in moderation." Moderation is about striking a balance between two opposing outcomes and forging a path that is just the right blend.

When that New Year's Eve ball drops, consider the Janus effect as a reminder to reference what was learned in past, look ahead to the future and always cleave to living and learning in the present. ${\mathbb Q}$



is a Leap Year, a year which contains one extra day, but it is also unique for another reason. On April 8, a total eclipse will be visible all the way from Dallas, Texas to Caribou, Maine. While Florida will not be in the path of totality (the line where the total eclipse will be visible), a partial eclipse will still be visible here. Viewing one safely can be a bit tricky, though, especially if you plan on traveling to the path of totality. Here are some tips and tricks for staying safe and making some bright memories.

Location:

Do you want to travel to the path of totality? Consider travel time and the

likelihood that there might be some heavy traffic, especially right off of the major highways. It's a good idea to call ahead for overnight accommodations. Finding a safe spot, free from hazards is a must. This could be in a yard or at a local park - be aware of traffic and others who will be stopping to view the eclipse.

Tools:

It is vital to have proper eye protection when viewing the eclipse. This could include special eclipse glasses or handheld solar viewers. If you want to buy yours, do not delay; they often sell out as the eclipse nears. You can also build your own pinhole projector to indirectly view the eclipse. Remember that sunglasses

will not be enough to protect your eyes, and permanent damage is possible without the proper equipment.

Memories:

Regardless of your solar eclipse plans, be sure to take some time to document the fun and excitement. Make note of the sounds that the animals make during the eclipse (crickets are known to start chirping during an eclipse), and pay attention to the other unique experiences of your viewing adventure. It will definitely be something special to look back on.

Maybe you would rather find something new? Explore diverse worlds and characters and let your imagination run free.





s we step into 2024, we welcome a New Year, as well as celebrate the arrival of a leap year. Leap years are a fascinating phenomenon that occur every four years*, providing an extra day in the month of February. Let's leap into some captivating facts and traditions to mark this special occasion.

'NOT EVERY FOUR YEARS IS A LEAP YEAR

Contrary to popular belief, leap years don't occur every four years precisely. Our calendar year is approximately 365.2422 days long, slightly longer than 365 days. To address this discrepancy, we round it down to 365 days. This rounding creates a challenge over time, causing the seasons to drift out of sync with the months. Without leap years, we'd eventually experience summer in November and fall in March.

To rectify this, we follow a rule: If a year is divisible by 100 but not by 400, it's not a leap year. For example, 2000 and 2400 are leap years because they adhere to this rule. Conversely, 2100 is not a leap year because it's divisible by 100 but not by 400. This rule ensures that our calendar remains in harmony with the Earth's orbit, preventing the seasons from straying from their expected positions.

LEAPLINGS

If you were born on February 29, congratulations! You belong to an exclusive group of approximately 5 million people worldwide known as "leaplings." The odds of being born on Leap Day stand at roughly 1 in 1,461. Leaplings technically celebrate

their birthdays only once every four years, making them a part of a unique and elite group. Notable leaplings include actress and singer Dinah Shore, motivational speaker Tony Robbins and hip-hop artist Ja Rule.

LEAP YEAR SUPERSTITIONS

According to Peter Moore, of UK-based travel magazine "Wanderlust," leap years are considered unlucky for marriage and other important life events in some cultures. People often avoid planning weddings or making major life decisions during leap years. In Scotland, they are even considered unlucky years to raise livestock in.

LEAP YEARS ON SCREEN

Leap years have made appearances in both films and television, often serving as a backdrop for plot twists and romantic gestures. Series such as "30 Rock" and "Parks and Recreation" have featured episodes set on Leap Day. Similarly, films like the 2010 romantic comedy "Leap Year" have explored the unconventional customs associated with leap years, including the tradition of women proposing to men. Ω





Magdalena amarre

"Southern Road to Freedom: Florida's Underground Railroad"

Join us as we welcome Magdalena Lamarre, retired Full Professor of History and Sociology at Miami-Dade College. She will be discussing the nation's first Underground Railroad, which was in Florida and served as a beacon of freedom for runaway slaves from the American South.

Established in the 17th century and existing before the better-known Northern

Underground Railroad, Florida's Underground Railroad allowed enslaved Africans to gain their freedom by escaping and earning their asylum in Spanish Florida. During this presentation we will learn about Florida's early history as a Spanish territory, the escape routes used by the runaway slaves, and the black communities they established before the abolition of slavery in the United States.

Lamarre's presentation is scheduled for 11 a.m. on Feb. 3 at the Sankofa Public Library at the Mary Sue Rich Community Center at Reed Place, 1821 NW 21st Ave., Ocala, FL.

Josh Wagg

rying something new can be challenging. Questions run through one's mind like how do I get started or will I be any good at it? These questions can often hamper our ability to venture into exciting and unfamiliar territory. Josh Wagg didn't let those doubts deter him as he leapt into becoming an American Ninja Warrior!

Born in Ocala and now managing the F45 training gym in Orlando, it may be surprising to learn that Josh was not an athletic kid. Josh says, "I tried a lot of sports in school but nothing stuck." He became a fan of the original Japanese version of Ninja Warrior and then the American version. He recalls watching it with his father and older sister. During one performance, his father commented that Josh would be pretty good at that, and

Josh agreed. Josh failed his first two tryouts. But, after meeting previous American Ninja Warrior contestant and future friend R.J. Roman, he tried again. The third time was the charm.

According to Josh, his first American Ninja Warrior experience was terrifying, as there were so many people involved in the production. To cope with this, he became like a "horse with blinders that didn't focus on anyone else." This technique helped build Josh's confidence in tackling the many obstacles on the course. It's not easy getting on TV, so on his first run he thought, "What can separate me from everybody else." Wearing a heavy metal t-shirt and black and white face paint did the trick!

As a child, Josh's mother introduced him to authors Stephen King, H.P. Lovecraft and Edgar Allen Poe. It was Poe's "The Black Cat"



that was the spark for Josh to create worlds with words and music. While living in Colorado, he would visit his local library and check out music CDs. Albums with overarching stories and themes from artists like Tool, Norma Jean and Iron Maiden shaped his musical interests. For Josh, "it's more like storytelling", and he now creates his own stories through music with his band **Tone Deaf Jesus.**

His advice about taking those first steps for any challenge is, "consistency will always be your best friend and will get you further than genetics." Josh is currently training for the 16th season of American Ninja Warrior, as well as training children and adults to compete. An athlete, a musician and a coach, Josh has accomplished a lot in his 27 years, and all it took was that first giant leap! \P
