

writing process; you bring the work to life.

Marion, Lake, Levy, Citrus, Alachua and Sumter county area writers wishing to participate must complete and submit an application by Friday, March 15, 2013. In lieu of a percentage of book sales, there is a \$10 charge per table. A jury will review the written work of each author applicant. Notification of selection will be submitted to all authors by March 31, 2013. To obtain an application, visit the public library website at http://library.marioncountyfl.org or call 352-671-8551.

In 2012, 61 authors participated in the first Marion County Public Library System "book feast," networked and shared information with the public about the field of writing. Iris Diaz, author of "Cuba: Another Side of the Story" who attended in 2012 said, "I sold some books, but was mainly intrigued by those who stopped by the table. Some were Cubans who shared their experiences, some were elderly and had visited the pre-Castro Cuba and were eager to share memories of their visit. A couple wanted some writing tips, they had stories to tell but were unsure of how to go about the book they wanted to write. Writers are storytellers, entertainers, and catching the attention of the audience is important."

ational Volunteer Week will be celebrated April 21-27. This year's theme, "Celebrate Service," reminds us to recognize the volunteer efforts of the many teens and adults who generously share their time and talents with the Marion County Public Library System. Last year, 260 regular volunteers provided 13,874 hours of service system wide. According to the Independent Sector, Florida's hourly value for volunteer service is \$18.66. That translates to an estimated \$258,889 worth of service to Marion County Public Library System.

How do volunteers serve their public libraries? Lots of ways. On any given day, you'll find teens and adults shelving books and shelf reading. Volunteers help with administrative duties including data entry and provide clerical support. They read to young children through the Library Express program. And they are literally the backbone of each and every special event that the library conducts, including the Fairy Tale Festival, CREATE and many, many others.

The Marion County Public Library System salutes the men, women and teens who help enhance the efforts of library staff and enrich our lives on a daily basis. **W**



Good Book!


t his birth in a dreary upstate New York town, no one would have predicted that Richard Russo would become a bestselling novelist. Russo's mother was emotionally troubled and his father absent. While his grandparents were supportive, they could not see any future for him beyond a job in the town's staggeringly toxic leather-processing industry, just like everyone else in the family.

In his new memoir "Elsewhere," Russo gives a bittersweet rendition of his escape from Gloversville. Urged on and accompanied by his mother, he moved to Arizona to


attend college with the idea of becoming a writer and an academic. Their journey across the United States in a jalopy aptly named "Gray Death" is an epic itself. Russo's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, "Empire Falls," marked his success as an author, but he continued to struggle with his mother's mental illness throughout her long life. "Elsewhere" is the story of a mother's ambitions for her son and his attempts to live up to her expectations while forging a

writing life of his own.

Melancholy at times, with touches of bittersweet humor. "Elsewhere" defines a time, a place, a family, and one man's evolution as an author. It is available at the Marion County Public Library System in regular print, large print, and as an audiobook. W



o you have writerly ambitions? The Marion County Public Library System has memoirs by authors such as Stephen King's "On Writing" and "A Writer's Life" by Gay Talese. 

A Day in the Life of Marion County Public Library System

n January 30, 2013, the Marion County Public Library System joined hundreds of Florida libraries participating in "Snapshot: A Day in the Life of Florida Libraries." or more than three decades in the political arena, Kenneth Hood "Buddy" MacKay ably represented Marion County and


Ocala, the town where he was born in 1933. But, retirement from politics did not mean a retreat to the proverbial rocking chair, because MacKay was then appointed by former President Bill Clinton to serve as his Special Envoy to the Americas. To this day, MacKay firmly believes that Florida should seek more trade with South American countries. He is convinced that Marion County could play a vital role in a burgeoning trade with this area, given its close proximity to I-75, and potentially making it an ideal location for an inland port. "Our future lies south—I feel that more strongly than ever," said MacKay.

Native son MacKay was delighted with the news that the state Division of Recreation and Parks was approved for the buyout of Silver Springs. He envi-

sions Marion County becoming a center for eco-tourism at its best, with the Greenway, the Horse Park, the Ocala National Forest, the Ocklawaha River, and the Water Management District

lands all coming together to attract nature lovers from all over the country.

As Florida launches its "Viva Florida 500" anniversary of the Spanish



occupation, MacKay had some interesting facts to relate as well. A research project undertaken by former Governor Lawton Childs's wife Rhea revealed that Florida had more Spanish governors than any other state in the U.S. Mrs. Childs also unearthed a copy of a letter from the Bishop of St. Augustine to the Archbishop of Cuba

> about a charity opera to support Catholic hospitals in Florida. "So much Florida history was never recorded because, under Spanish rule, the state was primarily Catholic and the Protestants wrote the history books."

> Five generations of MacKays have lived and are currently living in Ocala. His grandfather came from Scotland in 1880 and made his way to Ocala where he developed the first commercial rock crusher to separate phosphate from flint rock. Buddy and his wife Anne currently reside in their home on Lake Weir. Once a familiar occupant of the Halls of Congress and in the State Capitol, MacKay keeps it simple these days. "I had a great career, but I am happy to be a private citizen again," he said. We talked for a long time—after all, my Florida history dates back to

when Leroy Collins was governor and should at least make me an honorary Floridian? This is a title Buddy was happy to bestow upon me. W
