

DISCOVER a Good Book! Reviewed By Linda Porter

he first Europeans to reach Florida discovered something the indigenous peoples already knew—


Florida is a land abounding in natural resources and beauty. Ponce de León and his companions may have been the first tourists, but they were just the beginning of a parade of travelers looking to both enjoy and exploit the riches of the region.

Florida's past lies all around us, though it is sometimes partially buried by asphalt. Even densely settled areas are still yielding archaeological treasures. In his 2012 book, "Digging Miami," Robert S. Carr, Executive Director of the Archaeological and Historical Conservancy, reveals the rich 11,000-year history of the area. Carr



begins with Miami's prehistory as the watery homeland of a few thousand Tequesta Indians, and covers through the current period along with a lively description of the challenges of doing archaeology in a place of constant construction and demolition.

Journalist Craig Pittman writes about the exploitation side in his new book, "The Scent of Scandal: Greed, Be-



trayal, and the World's Most Beautiful Orchid." Silver Winner of the 2012 Florida Book Award in the Florida Nonfiction category, Pittman's book is an entertaining mix of true crime and nature writing. The combination of international corruption, extreme competition, and legal shenanigans involving the protection and misappropriation of rare plants

makes for a riveting story.

Interested in exploring a little known aspect of Florida history? Take a look at "Florida Cowboys: Keepers of the Last Frontier" by Ward Carlton Jr. This fascinating and beautifully illustrated book keeps alive the rapidly disappearing




tradition of cowboy life on the lush grasslands of our state, home to several endangered species as well as cattle and horses. \mathbf{W}





Marion County family has made a significant contribution to the Viva Florida 500 initiative that celebrates the many people, places and historical events that have shaped this great state. Drs. Ashley and Michelle White and their son Ethan's extensive collection of Spanish artifacts, discovered on their 700-acre White Ranch, is now on display at the Appleton Museum of Art through the end of the year.

The White collection confirms that Hernando de Soto, 700 soldiers, 200 horses, and a herd of long-legged pigs made the trek from Cuba through Marion County in 1539 on a mission to conquer what the Spanish referred to as "La Florida." The collection includes many exciting finds, such as coins dating back to 1471, lead shot from the matchlock firearm called an arquebus, and iron crossbow points (bolts). The coin collection is the largest to be found on the American mainland to date.

Drs. Ashley and Michelle White, who retired as head and neck pathology surgeons in 1998, are proud of the fact that the White Ranch is the oldest continuous ranch farmland in North America. Apart from their ongoing search for additional evidence of De Soto in Marion County, they are work-



ing to promote an improved breed of cattle and have purchased 4,200 acres of land for conservation.

Dr. Ashley White serves as a member of the College of Central Florida Advisory Board for the Appleton Museum of Art, as well as a board member and trustee for the Archaeological Institute of America. Dr. White is surprised that their find was a much bigger story in Spain, Ireland and England than here in the United States. "Maybe the general public doesn't realize that the United States had a long history before the arrival of the Pilgrims," he surmised.

The De Soto collection is well worth seeing. Go into the Appleton Museum by a side entrance, as extensive renovations are under way in the main entrance. And don't be at all surprised if Dr. Ashley White is around to expound upon this wonderful collection that marks such a significant era in Florida's history.
