The Story of Marion County

or those of you who are interested in the "back story" of Marion County, I encourage you to check out Ocali Country Scrapbook. Ocali Country Scrapbook is a fascinating glimpse into the nooks and crannies of Marion County. The series, divided into eight 30-minute segments, covers people and places from Fellowship to Summerfield, Dunnellon to Salt Springs and downtown Ocala through the years. The scrapbook, narrated by retired broadcast engineer, Tony Blalock, was a bicentennial project of the Kingdom of the Sun Girl Scouts. It was created in 1976, originally as slides, with cassette tape narration. Imagine the public library loaning out a slide carousel, slide projector and cassette player so that groups could enjoy this resource. In 1990 it was converted to video tape and in 2010 it was converted to DVD and is now also available as an e-resource. The historic photos of people and places and tidbits of historical facts take you back in time to when dirt roads were common and the population was sparse. Today, our Marion County population is almost 400,000. There are numerous photo comparisons of historic Marion County locales and 1976 Marion County. It would be interesting to bring these locales forward to 2024 to chronicle what is now on a particular site.

Another fabulous historical resource is the Historic Marion County Photography Collection on the library website. It can be found on a newly

available resource called Biblioboard. Visit marionfl.biblioboard.com. Other recommended reads for our Marion County back story include Marion County Remembers: "Salty Crackers" by Sybil Browne Bray (varies), and Riverboat Landing: A History of the Ocklawaha **River Steamboats** by M. C. Mason & E.A. Mueller (2012).





he beginning of the construction phase for the Freedom Public Library expansion became a reality on Tuesday, Nov. 12th as the Marion County Board of County Commissioners, library and county staff, elected officials, Friends of the Freedom Public Library and the public took part in a celebratory groundbreaking event.

Over the course of the next year, the current Freedom Public Library will more than triple its current space by expanding its square footage from 8,100 square feet to approximately 32,000 square feet. With the expanded public service areas, children, teens and adults will enjoy:

- Additional shelving space for library books and materials
- New study rooms
- Comfortable seating and spacious workspaces
- A separate 5,000-square-foot children's area with space for ageappropriate programming and a story time room
- An additional, larger meeting room
- A Friends of the Freedom Public Library bookstore that will offer gently used books, CDs and other materials for sale to the public. Proceeds from sales will benefit the Freedom Public Library programming and other efforts

A DESTINATION ON THE RISE

cala/Marion County tourism is bright in the Sunshine State with exciting new and future developments making the destination not only a place full of history and culture, but a location fostering opportunity. Visitors are not the only ones who get to enjoy additional activities offered in Ocala/Marion County—locals reap the benefits even more so.

One of the most significant additions to the area is World Equestrian Center (WEC), the largest equestrian facility in the country. WEC features two hotels, an RV park, multiple restaurants, top-notch equestrian facilities and special events open to the public throughout the year! In addition to providing over 80,000 square feet of event space, the upcoming Event Center at WEC will feature four new restaurants, including two rooftop concepts.

In addition to equestrian sports, Ocala/Marion County is becoming one of the top destinations for elite swimming and aquatic competitions in the southeast with Florida Aquatic Swimming and Training (FAST). FAST features a massive indoor Olympic competition pool, an outdoor warm-up pool, a splash pad, and free swimming lessons for all third graders in Marion County.

New culinary experiences are also flavoring up Ocala/Marion County! Restaurants are popping up all over town—from upscale steakhouses to rooftop bars and causal pizza eateries in











downtown Ocala, there's something for everyone. Midtown Station, a new hot spot looking over Tuscawilla Park, transformed an old fire station into a brewery, distillery, multiple restaurants and music venue. Expected to open early 2025, The Forge is currently under development just north of the square, in the "Midtown" district and will be a dining experience destination of its own with multiple restaurants, a brewery, a nightclub and event venue.

Downtown Ocala is a vibrant hub with a mix of historic charm and modern amenities. The Walk of Champions, a new self-guided tour, allows visitors to discover the area's rich equestrian history with bronze plaques in the sidewalks representing famous horses connected to the destination. Download the OcalaMarion Travel Guide App to see images and videos of these equestrian stars to make this a truly immersive experience.

The downtown district is also a hub for special events like art walks, concerts, holiday events, markets and more. Check out our full events calendar at <u>OcalaMarion.com</u>.

We want all locals and visitors to know they are welcome in Ocala/Marion County from the moment they arrive and that is one of the reasons for the new signage on Interstate-75 currently under construction! The South Gateway will be located on the 42nd St flyover at mile marker 349 welcoming drivers heading north. This should be complete


by early 2025. There will also be a gateway at the future interchange just north of Ocala, where the much anticipated Buc-ee's Ocala Travel Center is planned!

Scheduled to open in Spring 2025, the new public library branch will be located in the building west of the Silver Springs Shores community center, known as the youth center. Efforts to renovate this Marion County municipal service taxing unit building will be provided through Marion County Community Services CDBG funding as the site falls within its guidelines. Marion County facilities management will oversee the project and Architecture Studio, Inc. will design the space.

The new public library branch will be a fullservice library to include materials and library resources in a variety of formats, including: Public Computers and Printing; Children, Adult and Young Adult Collections; Children's Programming; Item Request Capability and Reference Services.

A new branch library supervisor II and two full-time public services assistants will be on-site to assist community residents. Public service hours are pending at this time and will be posted on the Marion County Public Library System website at *Library.MarionFL.org* as soon as the schedule is determined.

arilyn Ross is a familiar face to staff working at the Headquarters-Ocala Public Library. Always fashionably attired in a crisp, stylish shirt, slacks, makeup and jewelry, she graciously greets everyone with a smile as she regularly checks out her books. One would be surprised to learn that a person so regal and independent also has the distinction of being someone who has experienced so many chapters in life and may soon claim the title of centenarian; a person who is 100 years of age.

Marylyn Patricia Ross was born in the wilderness of Ontario Canada, in a little town called Iroquois Falls. Her mother was a musician and opera singer and her father owned a paper mill. Marilyn recalls that when hard times affected some of the plant employees, her father would host talent shows and use the proceeds to help pay for their food and clothing.

She was enrolled in an all-girls boarding school in Winnipeg, Canada and after graduating went to college at the University of Manitoba. "The beautiful thing about Canada is that everyone came from somewhere else. My best friend was from Hungary and served in the Hungarian army," she says. Marylyn was very active in the theater and was in many plays, including *Carmen*. She later made the big move to Florida, where she attended the University of Florida (UF) after it had integrated from an all-boys college to coed.

While studying at UF, Marylyn met her husband George Ross. George later served in the Air Force during World War II. The family moved to Ocala where he operated the DW David Insurance agency. During this time Marylyn started teaching 2nd grade at Blessed Trinity School and then at Grace Episcopal school for 15 years, with an impressive 40 years as a teacher. As a teacher she knew the importance of libraries in the scope of continued learning and would bring her students to the old Ocala Public Library location on Osceola Avenue.



As an avid reader, Marylyn describes her interests as "reading everything". She says, "You can learn how to do just about anything by reading books." While she currently prefers romance novels, she reads books of all kinds. It's this fascination with books and learning that she passed onto her students. "I hope that I instilled in them a joy for the library," she says.

Marylyn has lived a full, rich 98 years with many ups and downs and has learned to "laugh a lot" over the years. She has an everlasting message, "be kind and treat people with kindness". Marylyn reminisces, "l'm very fortunate, l've had a wonderful life and met some wonderful people." With two children, three grandchildren and four great grandchildren, there is much to be shared about each chapter of her life's story. Γ
