BOOK REVIEW:

The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society



ooks are a great support in times of trouble. They entertain. educate. enlighten while giving us insight into the lives of others. Book lovers will enjoy The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society, by Mary Ann Shaffer and Annie Barrows, for its engaging characters and many references to books. Told through the exchange of letters among a group of friends, the novel starts off with letters from Juliet Ashton to her friends and to her publisher. World War II has just ended and the English people are picking themselves up and looking around to see what is left of their country. Juliet had been the author of a newspaper column about wartime experiences. She's sick to death of war stories and is casting about for a topic for a new book. A fresh chapter in Juliet's life begins when she receives a letter from Dawsey Adams, a farmer living on Guernsey, one of the Channel Islands hard-hit by the German occupation. Dawsey found her name written on the flyleaf of a beloved used book, thus starting off a correspondence among Juliet and the inhabitants of the island. Through the letters the Guernsey Islanders tell the story of wartime deprivation, harsh punishment, and loss of freedom and life, but also of the way the human spirit shines through the pains of war and how acts of everyday heroism get Reviewed By Linda Porter

us through the hard times. One such act was the creation of the Guernsey Literary Society, formed spontaneously as a means of avoiding punishment when a group of friends were caught breaking curfew by a patrol of German soldiers. The potato peel pie came later, when

the group began meeting as a real literary society and one of their members declared that there could be no meeting without refreshments, no matter how inadequate. Books and good fellowship got the Guernsey Islanders through the war, and books and a new relationship will launch Juliet into the next stage of her life.

The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society is available at the Marion County Public Library System in regular print, large print, and as an audiobook. Check out the audiobook for a real listening treat. The full cast narration superbly captures the warmth and humor of the novel, allowing the personalities of Juliet, of her best friend, Sophie, her friend and publisher, Sidney, and the Guernsey Islanders Eben, Isola, Elizabeth, and, especially, Dawsey, to emerge through their letters.
