




An Honor

lorida's public libraries play an important role in the voting process, and the Marion County Public Library System is no exception. Belleview, Dunnellon, Forest, and Freedom public libraries are all host sites for early voting. During this time, the public libraries clear meeting rooms of all other activities to better accommodate the needs of early voters. In addition to hosting early voting activities, public libraries are also places where individuals can come to register to vote, change their party affiliation and update their personal voter information. Library staff receives training from the Supervisor of Election's staff, and are bound by strict legal requirements regarding when and how to offer, receive and return voter applications, as well as how to report statistics.

We all recognize that our citizens have multiple venues to register to vote. We can also acknowledge that we have easy voting access with absentee ballots, early voting and convenient hours on the actual polling day. Sadly, however, we have many who do not register to vote or do not exercise their right to vote once they are registered. I, frankly, will never understand why. I believe that registering to vote and participating in the process is a privilege, a right, a duty and an honor, not to be taken lightly. Please exercise your right, your duty, your privilege and your honor on November 6, 2012.






The National Voters Registration Act of 1993 established public libraries as places where citizens could go for easy access to voter forms and publications.

Good Boo

alter Cronkite was often called "the most trusted man in America." A new biography, "Cronkite," by historian Douglas Brinkley shows why the longtime journalist was admired by so many. Cronkite began his career as a print reporter on the front lines during World War II. Later, he hosted television documentaries and served as anchor of the "CBS Evening News" from 1962 until his retirement in 1981. Cronkite covered every major event and every political convention in recent American history and did it with gravitas and integrity.

A more complicated man than many realized, Cronkite was known for his enthusiastic support of the space program, championship of civil rights,



subtle criticism of the Vietnam War, and dignified yet emotional coverage of the assassination of John F. Kennedy. In an era before social media, Cronkite was the voice millions of Americans turned to for news and reporting of breaking events.


"Cronkite" is an absorbing biography of a significant figure in American life. The many photographs of Cronkite, his family, interview subjects, and peers will bring back memories for many readers. Although Cronkite died in 2009 at age 92, his favorite tag line, "That's the way it is" still resounds.





o, we wondered, how does a national election year impact Marion County Supervisor of Elections Dee Brown and her staff?

"Tremendously," says Brown, whose 33-year tenure in office officially ends January 7, 2013. "It impacts every aspect of voter registration, since there is much more interest, and that necessitates us adding not only more poll workers, but temporary staff as well. In addition, this is a unique election year since we have to contend with reapportionment in our state, affecting where we draw precinct lines and where we have to locate our polling facilities." Brown added that they are already training poll workers for the November election.

Dee Brown started her career with Marion County on January 2, 1979, as a deputy supervisor, with statistics keeping and updating records among her varied duties. She first ran for county supervisor in 1986, won, and has been re-elected six times. She is proud of the fact that during her tenure she has overseen more than 131 local, state, and national elections. In 1979, when she started work in the office, there were 45,000 registered voters,

in 1986 there were 73,265, and as of today there are 216,215.

The public library system has played a large part in the operation of Brown's office. When the motor-



voter legislation was passed in 1993, public libraries were designated as voter registration agencies. Thus, Brown's office worked closely with the public library to ensure that they understood the process. "The state mandated that we can use public libraries for early voting, and we use four of the branches for that purpose," said Brown.

Recalling the 2000 election, Brown said that when the Supreme Court finally ruled on the outcome

> she asked a local reporter, "Does that mean that I can go home and bake Christmas cookies for my grandchildren?" This is a great segue into the fact that Dee and husband Jerry, married 48 years, have six children, 12 grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren, with twin "greats" on the way!

> Ms. Brown is proud of her community involvement as well. She has been a member of Altrusa for 23 years, active in the United Way, an Ocala/Marion County Chamber of Commerce member, and member of St. Paul's United Methodist Church. She also supports "Casual Friday," that allows her staff to contribute to various charitable organizations.

"My father taught me that life's greatest gifts are family, country and religion. In my tenure of 26 years as Supervisor of Elections I have to say that it has been an honor and a privilege to have served the citizens of Marion County," said this longserving servant of the people. W
