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

Things To Know About eBooks


hanks to the generosity of the Friends of the Ocala Public Library, the Marion County Public Library System is able to introduce electronic books (eBooks) to our library users. We are very excited to finally be able to offer this new service, however small it may be upon the initial rollout. We appreciate the patience each of you has demonstrated as you have waited for this much anticipated service.

As with any new service, there are a fair number of adjustments. With everything being new, some helpful things to know about eBooks include:

- 1. Not every title is available in eBook format.
- Some titles are *only* available in eBook format. 2.
- 3. Some publishers will not sell eBooks to libraries. These publishers include Penguin, Simon & Schuster, MacMillan and Perseus. As a result, many popular authors and titles will be unavailable through the library.
- The cost of an eBook to libraries far exceeds what you, as a consumer, pay. 4.
- eBooks will have a 7-day check out. The title will then magically disappear and 5. move on to the next person.
- Overdrive is the company name of our eBook vendor. 6.
- Overdrive eBooks are compatible with all major desktop and mobile platforms, 7. including Windows® and Mac® computers, smartphones such as iPhone®, Android[™] and BlackBerry[®], and eBook readers including Sony[®] Reader and Kindle® (Kindle books available to US schools and libraries only).

Look for more information on the library website regarding how to begin using this new service or ask a librarian. Enjoy!

That was easy. Now take the next step—mark your calendars for a free **Author Expo** where you can talk to locally published authors and learn first-hand how to get published along with the opportunity to buy their books.

The Author Expo date is Saturday, April 14, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Headquarters-Ocala Public Library, 2720 E. Silver Springs Blvd., Ocala, Florida.

"This is our first time for an Author Expo," said **Roseanne Russo**, Manager of Information Services for the Marion County Public Library System. "It is an opportunity for many talented people in Marion County and surrounding counties to talk about their books, get exposure and network."

The event is open to all local authors in Marion County and adjacent counties—Lake, Levy, Citrus, Alachua and Sumter. There is limited space. Books can be for sale. Registration includes a \$10 table fee in lieu of a percentage of sales from books. Applications are due by March 16, and forms are available at *library.marioncountyfl.org*, at the HQ-Ocala location and at *www.friendsoftheocalalibrary.org*.

For the public, the event is free. In addition to talking one-on-one with authors, the library will have a table/ exhibit on how to get published.

"People will like this Expo, especially people interested in publishing their own books," said Russo. "Authors can share publishing experiences."

The event fits in well with National Library Week.

"It is a celebration of National Library Week, and we thought it would be a good chance to give local authors an opportunity to present their books. We support local authors all we can, and this will give them a chance to share their books with the public," said **Sara Dassance**, President of the Friends of the Ocala Pubic Library, a key sponsor/partner for the event.

very first library memory is as a firstgrader. My whole class gathered on the media center floor, our necks stretched and heads craned for a glimpse of the pictures as the librarian read the words. At six years of age, story time was magical. I still find the magic in a story, but now I also wonder how a picture and story meld together to capture a child's imagination.

Some writers are also illustrators and artists. But what if you're not an artist? Most major publishers hire their own illustrators to marry your words with your vision. All you need to do is submit your manuscript, and wait...

If you're not comfortable letting a publisher make those decisions, you'll need to hire an artist. If vou're unfamiliar with local artists. take a look online. Most artists forhire will have a website featuring samples of their work and pricing. If you find established artists cost a little more than you can afford, get in touch with local art schools or the community college where students may be willing to help you at a more reasonable cost.

Hands down, your most important resource is the latest edition of the "Children's Writers and Illustrators Market." There you'll find over 700 listings for publishers and illustrators, along with pricing and submission criteria. But the most important piece of advice to remember for writers and illustrators is to keep creating! W



She is assisted by the Atlanteans, led by Oi'Alli, who has her own reasons to hate Jack Darcy, leader of the werewolves and captain of their mammoth ship, The Howl.

This series has gotten better and better with convincing fantasy elements, greater roles for female characters, and nice touches of the supernatural. Chad Douglas is a writer to watch, and it is a pleasure watching his terrific imagination bloom.

Dear Friends,

In this first issue of WORDS of 2012, I want to look backward and forward. First, 2011 was an exciting one for the Friends of the Ocala Library, Inc. We were able to support our library with \$73,000 in financial support through sales of donated books in the Book Market and the quarterly book sales. These funds were used for programming for children including the summer reading program, fairytale festival, library express, Born to Read, and reading readiness programs. CREATE, a weekend featuring the incredibly talented teens in Marion County, was funded by Friends. The audiovisual capability of the meeting rooms was upgraded. We supported further education of the library staff. WORDS was published quarterly. Carl Hiaasen spent a Saturday in Marion County, speaking with hundreds of school children in the afternoon and to a capacity crowd of adults in the evening. All this was made possible by hours of work by our dedicated board and Book Market volunteers. Thank you.

Our membership reached a new high of 503 members. This provides us with a strong base as we advocate for state and county support for our library system.

In the year ahead we have budgeted \$108,000 to the library to continue the above programs plus \$25,000 to launch eBooks for Marion County library users. We ask that you will continue your support by joining or renewing your membership in Friends, donating your gently used books, magazines, CDs, and DVDs to the Book Market, AND by spreading the word of the Book Market. ocal poet Lena Lewin fondly remembers her childhood in her native Jamaica. She also remembers her parents teaching their children values that would stand her in good stead in later years. In 1978, widowed, tired of the socialist regime of Prime Minister Michael Manley, with \$50 in her pocket and two suitcases full of her belongings, she emigrated to the U.S. where she joined her daughter in Chicago. She became a U.S. citizen in 1984. But, for a native of tropical Jamaica, frigid Chicago eventually proved too cold for Lena and her daughter, and they moved to Ocala in 1981.

Lena wrote her first poem at the age of nine and has been composing them ever since. Her love of the craft shines through when she talks about poetry. "It lifts the spirit and is a great means of communication, a compelling force to share with others," she said.

A member of Poetry of Ocala, Lena has won numerous awards for her poetry and has published two books. She is a member of the Academy of American Poets and the Florida State Poets organization. She says the public library has been a great resource for Poetry Ocala members, providing facilities for their meetings, and she is looking forward to their participation in National Poetry Month on April 22. Her works, and those of other members, will be featured.

Lena is also active in other community organizations, including the Caribbean-American Alliance, the poetry community, and in her church. She is a former elder, and an active member at Fort King Presbyterian Church.

Poetry and inspiration come naturally to Lena. When asked if she had a favorite poem, she recited from memory. (*at right*)

Then Lena left this writer with a traditional Jamaican farewell—"Walk good." \mathbf{W}



Why did you die, young soldier And what were you fighting for? The angel smiled as he questioned The soldier just home from the war.

I didn't die, said the soldier I just saw some lovely stairs And I climbed right into heaven, On a stairway fashioned of prayers.

Each step was the prayer of a loved one, They made it easy to climb. I was fighting for all things beautiful To man since the Dawn of Time.
