

BULDING LIVES at the Forest Public Library By Lucy Beebe Tobics

magine open space, comfortable, colorful chairs, a spacious children's room that encourages children to come in, windows overlooking a park-like setting, rows of tall book shelves inviting browsing, and computers all lined up. Every inch of space is inviting and welcoming.

"We've been open for 14 months. This is a very warm, spacious place, and the community is so thankful. The library serves as a community center," says Greg Malak, branch library supervisor.

The Forest Public Library building sits gently on the land. It is the first government building in Marion County to be LEED certified (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design). One green example: Outside are four rain barrels, each holding 500 gallons of water that is used for lawn and building maintenance needs.

Inside, the computers are a star attraction.

"Kids do their homework on computers," says Malak. "People of all ages use the computers for job applications, for checking e-mail, and anyone can use the wireless."

Malak tells a recent story of a gentleman he calls "Mr. Builder" who asked for help with the computers. He was in his late 40s with a career in the building trades, but currently out of work.

"He explained he needed a job but accepted the reality that his lifelong skills in the building trades may





no longer be needed," says Malak. "Several of his friends told him that some stores and businesses received applications online only and suggested he come to the library."

With some help logging onto the Internet and learning to use the mouse, backspace keys, and other functions, Mr. Builder completed one application and felt like he'd accomplished something. "He came back every day for about a week and each day still required some assistance but this help was minimal and you could see his sense of confidence in his abilities slowly grow," says Malak. Then Mr. Builder announced he had an interview the next day. A

few days later he was hired.

This is one of many success stories happening here.

If you haven't said the word "WOW" in a while, do come and visit the Forest Public Library. It is a big WOW. \mathbf{W}

Perhaps you'd rather travel through time? Good his-






