

ow do I love thee? Let me count the ways... In this issue of WORDS, you will read about the first *Snapshot*: A Day in the Life of the Marion County Public Library System event which occurred on January 29.

Snapshot was a state-wide project designed to collect information, including photos, illustrating the many and varied ways in which our public libraries are used. It also offered our patrons and the public an opportunity to tell us how they feel about their public library. Over 600 patrons willingly and joyfully shared their comments about the Marion County Public Library System, and what it means to have access to its services.


One of our Belleview users wrote, "On our tight budget having access to free books helps fill a need for me and my kids. Kids Programs for toddlers, tweens & teens provide safe learning activities & crafts. We LOVE Toddler Time!!"

The project coincided with February's Love Your Library month, when we asked library users to pen their favorite reasons why they love their public library. Again, the response has been overwhelming as evidenced by the heartshaped note cards written by patrons that now adorn our library windows.

A sampling of comments includes: "I have loved them all my life. I started reading when I was very young and am now 81," "I love my library because they are my best friends," "It's free," "It's Awesome," "I love to learn," "I can read for free" (this was repeated over and over again) and "I love to read."

In these challenging economic times, the outpouring of appreciation and support for our public libraries is a reminder to all of us who work here that what we do does make a difference, in the lives of children and adults in Marion County, across Florida and this nation.

SNAPSH

A day in the life of Marion County's Public Libraries



n January 29th, the Marion County Public Library System posed for Snapshot: A Day in the Life of Marion County's Public Libraries. Created by the American Library Association, Snapshot: A Day in the Life of Libraries is part of a nationwide program designed to showcase what goes on in dynamic, modern libraries.

Why is it important to publicize what really happens in libraries these days? According to the Florida Library Association, which organized Florida's participation in the Snapshot project, nearly 89 million people visit Florida's public libraries every year, compared to approximately 67 million people who visit Florida's famous theme parks. Public libraries are utilized now more than ever before and the Snapshot project was a way to showcase the importance of public libraries.

What if a comparable list of statistics could be compiled for libraries across Florida for one day? How many patrons checked out books? How many individuals used library computers? How many programs were attended by children...by teens... by adults?

Vanguard High School senior Andrew Kays coordinated Marion County's Public Library System's Snapshot Day. Kays, 17, used Facebook to recruit forty-two volunteers to staff five Marion County Public Library branches. Volunteers spoke to library visitors about Snapshot day, offered surveys for patrons to describe their use of the library, and took photos. The information collected by Kays and his volun-

teers, together with other statistics, has been provided to the Florida Library Association.

From some of the 550 surveys collected, it's clear that Marion County's portion of those 89 million Florida library users do love their libraries. "I'm proud to show visitors this wonderful place," stated one Dunnellon Public Library patron. Another avid reader in Belleview says, "My library is like my best friend. I am also honored by the fact that my granddaughter shares my love of books. She is a regular customer."

The coordination of Snapshot: A

Day in the Life of Marion County's Public Libraries will serve as Andrew Kays' final project in achieving Eagle Scout status. "As an Eagle Scout project, it was a fantastic opportunity to see what happens at the library; all the ways it's utilized by the community, and how the community and sponsors (like Clear Channel) were so willing to participate in this event," said Kays. For the Marion County Public Library System, Snapshot is further evidence of the needs met by libraries and of the loss our communities would suffer without them. W

eddick, a town in Northwest Marion County, has a population of approximately 669. But as the home of the Reddick Public Library, small numbers have never diminished a large interest in books. Jim Stroup (below), the mayor of Reddick, previous library volunteer and staff member for five years, straightens up the big, stuffed bear in the children's room at the Reddick Public Library and puts a book in its paws to make the bear a reading model for kids. get the message. Preschoolers, many from Head Start, are regulars at storytime. Children's librarian, Linda Brooke, comes from the Headquarters-Ocala Library once a week to

present storytimes to preschool children. "I like the community here, the people I see every week, their involvement in their community," says Linda.

The Reddick Public Library officially opened as a branch of the Marion County Public Library on October 1, 1988. In 1993, the library moved to its current home, a building that used to be the agricultural facility for the old Reddick School. There are now over 19,000 books in the collection, not including paperbacks.

Today, the bank of four public access computers next to the checkout counter stays busy pretty much

all the time. Visitors check e-mail and stay in touch with families, update their resumes, and search for jobs. A couple comes into the library with a bag of books, all mysteries, to return.



arl is coming! Get in the mood for Carl Hiaasen's April 16th appearance in Marion County by reading his latest novel, Star Island.

Cherry Pye, a twentysomething has-been, lacks the talent needed to restart her flagging singing career. Cherry's life is one long series of bad choices—especially those involving illegal substances.

Her manager/parents have hired an actress to appear as their daughter when Cherry is too drugged out to appear in public or is in yet another round of rehab. The hook is that Cherry doesn't know about Ann DeLuisa, her body double, and her manipulative parents don't want her to find out.

When Ann is mistakenly kidnapped by Bang Abbott, a deranged paparazzo with unsavory plans for Cherry, she appeals for help to Skink, the homeless, former Florida governor familiar from earlier Hiaasen novels. Ann is beginning to think that what she really needs to be rescued from is her career as Cherry's body double.

Full of wickedly witty humor, Hiaasen uses his dazzling storytelling skills in Star Island to cheerfully skewer corrupt developers, aggressive paparazzi, and the absurdity of pop culture, all under the baking Florida sun. Outrageously entertaining! W





ack in 1977, Library Systems
Supervisor Linda Watson
learned from her mother that

the Ocala Public Library.

Linda, Ocala-born and a graduate of Vanguard High School, successfully applied for the job and started work shelving and repairing books. The job became permanent a year later, and led to a 34-year career, during which Linda progressed through the ranks as cataloguing assistant, inter-library loans department, supervisor of technical services systems, and administrator of Integrated Library systems.

there was a part-time job opening at

Appointed Library Systems Supervisor in 1993, Linda has witnessed many changes in the way the library serves the community, the most dramatic being the introduction of public access computers.

"The Gates Foundation had given us 100 computers for use in the main library and branches, and the public response to the program was immediate and enthusiastic," said Linda. "We had to learn how to allot time spots in order to make it fair to all, since our early users were reluctant to leave their computer space." A glance into



the public computer room at the main library on any day of the week will confirm that all the computers are being used, with patrons awaiting their turn.

There are 202 computers distributed throughout the Marion County Public Library System for public use, and 156 computers for staff system-wide.

Away from the office, Linda is very involved with her two grandsons, Cayden (7), and Gavin (4), whose father, Chad, tragically lost his wife and their mother at the age of 26.

Linda is currently teaching Cayden how to ride a trail bike on the Santos Trail. Linda also runs five miles three times a week, and in 2008 ran the 26.3-mile Disney Marathon, a feat she does not want to repeat. She also ran in the 2006 Disney Half Marathon. Oh, and she also works out at the Compass Gym regularly.

"I really enjoy what I do every day, which makes my job so much easier. And the fact that my bosses have confidence in me makes it even more enjoyable," said Linda. W
